I would like to take this opportunity to thank the whole village for the way it has come together and particular thanks to Poulshot Friends and Neighbours for organising food and prescription collections for those most at risk in our village.

### PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

The Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authority and Police and Crime Panel Meetings) (England and Wales) Regulations 2020 ("the 2020 Regulations") come in to force on 4 April. The Regulations:

- 1. Enable the Parish to postpone the Annual Meeting to May 2021, along with any elections and retirements.
- 2. Allows Local Government to conduct meetings remotely. More detail will be promulgated prior to the meeting on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30. Please keep an eye on the Poulshot web site.

### LAND BEHIND HIGHER GREEN FARM

The process of transferring the ownership of the land behind Higher Green Farm to the Parish Council is drawing to a conclusion. You may ask - why has this taken so long?

The land comprises 1.25 acres, and the transfer to the Parish Council was part of the process required to enable the development of Higher Green Farm by the then Pippin Homes. A small proportion of the land was required in compensation for the de-registering of the access as Village Green.

Planning permission was applied for (15/12305/FUL) and granted to change the use of the land from agriculture to recreation on 16 February 2016. The change of use granted is for 'informal recreational use'. This does mean that any ideas for the recreational use of the land will be subject to planning permission if they involve construction.

The Parish Council exchanged contracts with Pippin Homes on 5<sup>th</sup> March 2019. There are a number of reasons why the transaction has not moved to completion, the principle being the requirement for a letter from Wiltshire Council.

On the change of use from Agriculture to Recreation, the value of the land increased. When Pippin Homes bought Higher Green Farm from Wiltshire Council an uplift clause was included, that required the payment of a proportion of that increase to Wiltshire Council. The letter from Wiltshire Council ensures that the Parish Council will not have to pay this.

Steve Housby and I met with Angus Williams of Royd Withy King on Thursday I2 March, he confirmed that all was in place and on the proviso that Higher Green Farm (Ivor Salt) was ready we could move to completion in short order. I will let you know when we have.

In the meantime, we will shortly become the owners of 1.25 acres of recreation land. As a Village, we need to decide what we want to do with it. We are fortunate that we have the community fund and, in time, when the fourth house is built, we will receive £26,000 from Higher Green Farm as part of the section 106 agreement made with Wiltshire Council for granting planning permission.

I would urge all parishioners to put forward their ideas for the best use for this land, however weird, madcap, bonkers or straight you think they might be, they will all be considered. I hope that this can all be done in a civil manner, whether you agree or disagree with a scheme, let us have a civilised discussion without resorting to the impersonal (and sometimes far too personal) communication of social media.

# From the vicar ... The View from my window (virtually speaking).

### From our local Councillor

Coronavirus or COVID-19, what an incalculable difference those words and their meaning have had to our lives. Even those of us in Wiltshire who currently live in a low risk area and with fewer tragic deaths here than in other areas have seen a total change to the way we live. I write this as we reach the fourth week of lockdown with little sign of emergence in sight. My own family are observing severe segregation due to underlying medical issues but together we share the trials and tribulations of this dreadful situation.

There is little local political news. In local government Councillors have stepped back and supported the experienced and professional officers of Wiltshire Council in their seven day a week endeavours to deal with the effects of the crisis and keep essential local services going. This is not the time for political point scoring although social media is full of disquiet at the failure of some national journalists and some national politicians to support the national mood of stoic resolution to tackle this crisis. Critical local services such as refuse collection are continuing with little interruption and Wiltshire Council is doing its very best to efficiently facilitate the local distribution of essential government assistance to businesses through the grant system.

Much of the real local work is taking place in our towns and villages. The spirit is a typical British effort of rallying round to help the most vulnerable in our communities. In our own Melksham Community area we were one of the quickest off the mark with a Melksham Community Aid system and website active within days of the start of the crisis and our Area Board meets on line every week to help to coordinate the Area effort. Councillors are in regular touch with local efforts and trying to help to oil the wheels of bureaucracy. Central Government has decided that many aspects of local government are to continue (and this includes the planning system) although the provision of virtual committee meetings has been allowed in the CORVID Act for all aspects of local government.

Locally every village and hamlet in the Area has seen the emergence of a commendable system to look after those who are struggling to look after themselves by collecting shopping, prescriptions or other services that individuals cannot access themselves. Please support these Herculean efforts as they continue to make a difference to people's lives especially the superb effort in Poulshot where individuals are doing so much, and businesses are adapting to make such a difference to local life.

Lockdown is not easy for anyone, whether or not the individual is vulnerable but already there are positive signs even from lockdown and this has started with families and communities having quality time for each other and taking a step back from our busy lives. I doubt any of us will go back to precisely the lives we lived before but in the meantime Best Wishes and PLEASE we all need to STAY HOME, in doing so SAVE LIVES and PROTECT THE NHS
