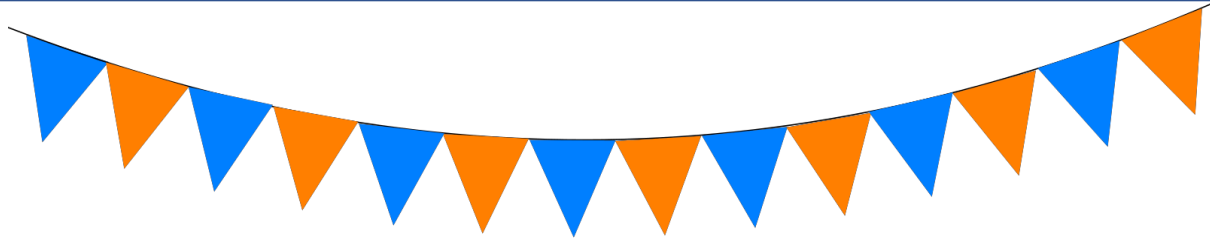

NEWS FROM POULSHOT PARISH COUNCIL

*The formal minutes are on the PCC website.
This is an informal overview.*

The meeting started brilliantly, as WCC Councillor Tamara Reay told us we were the coolest Parish Council in the county. However, this turned out not to be in respect of my fetching straw hat, Mike's pink shorts or Richard's racy summer shirt, but to be due to the extremely efficient air conditioning provided by the Village Hall. Ah well. One day.

We began with discussions raised by members of the public and related to village social events, either long postponed (**the VE Day commemorations**) and hopefully still going to happen (**the village fete**). Bureaucracy had somewhat got in the way of organising a refund for a hog roast booked for the VE commemorations, but eventually a solution was found; the hog roast deposit will be used for a future village celebration and the refund will be sorted. All agreed it was jolly nice of the person concerned to have been so good about it and waited so long. Kate Hunloke, for the Village Fete committee, shared the need to re-arrange the date of the Village Fete to Sunday 15th September due to a previous booking in the Village Hall on the Saturday. Health and Safety reared it's very sensible head at the potential for injury if the fete was going on at the same time as cricket on the village green, although there was some (surely unjustifiable) doubt as to the capacity of the cricketers to hit the ball that far ... Sensibly, it was decided to leave it to Kate to discuss with Declan Gaule, Chairman of the Cricket Club. There's fuller information about the fete later in the magazine.

And then it was on to the business on the agenda. Approval of the minutes was deferred to the next meeting, and then it was time for the Chair, Councillor Mike Davis, to give his report. This began with the news that the Clerk, Richard Culverhouse, has decided to resign as Clerk, although generously he has agreed to stay until a replacement can be found. The Parish Council will be advertising for the post in due course, but do let any of the Councillors know if you would be interested in applying for the post. Happier news was the successful re-opening of The Raven – and as Councillor Davis said, all of us supporting the pub will be important in ensuring we keep it going. So go on – pop along and sacrifice yourself to lunch, supper, a pint of Wadworth's, a cheeky gin and tonic or a large glass of Malbec (thanks Lyn), secure in the knowledge you're doing it for the good of the village.

WCC Councillor Tamara Reay immediately, selflessly, indicated her willingness to support The Raven, before moving onto questions from Parish Councillors. The re-surfacing on the dual carriageway was quite a hot topic (apparently Wilts Council will be fixing their, ... um, cock-up, mistakes in doing it, poor planning in doing it on a very hot day? ... on August 1st). So hopefully it will have been sorted by the time you read this. Less dramatic, a question on the cutting and maintenance of ditches, hedges and byways etc led to discussion on the Parish Steward, who is responsible for aspects of this around the village, and the PCC will follow up on this.

There are 7 of us on the PCC, and in addition to meeting in full at the bi-monthly meetings, we also need to set up sub-committees to focus on key areas. This is both so that we can be efficient in how we work, and so that people in the village know who to contact about specific issues. Councillor Dan Scott has been working on this; the proposed sub-committees are Finance and Audit, Employment and Complaints, Maintenance, Highways, Higher Green Farm, Health and Safety and Risks, Information (to include the revised website, media, Facebook page) and Data, and Safeguarding. Councillor Scott is sorting terms of reference for each sub-committee, and the plan is that we will all then match our skills / expertise to the sub-committees. Riveting, I know, but important in helping us work effectively for and with everyone in the village. We should be all-sub-committee'd up by the next meeting in September, and the information, with Councillors' contact details, will be published on the (new) website, Facebook page and village magazine so that people in the village know who to communicate with re any issues they wish to raise.

Planning is one of those things that can really divide a community. It can be hard, and sometimes downright annoying, to recognise that what we have planned to make our own little bit of Britain completely perfect may not be wholeheartedly welcomed by our friends and neighbours. I rather like to think of the farm and what goes on in the field behind my house as being there to enhance my life, and it was lovely to see the field and the horses when I moved in 21 years ago. The grain store is less appealing than the horses, (although I hardly notice it now) but maintaining a working farm in the village trumps all that (oh dear, need to think of a new phrase, that now inevitably makes me think of Donald). That being said, it's also easier to live with as it all went through planning, and other people looking at the wider picture made the decision, which has been followed through and adhered to. It's less easy when we are faced with breaches of planning permission. The PCC as a matter of principle will be monitoring and following up any breaches of planning in the village.

Applications for **9 Mill Lane, 24 The Green and camping pods at Cen Hill Marina** (good for bringing tourism to the community) were supported, but the **menage and stables in Hay Lane** remain problematic and, despite emails from the Clerk there has been no response from the Council Enforcement Officer. That being so, the planning / feedback from the public remains open, so do put through your view. They'll only know that people are upset about planning breaches if we tell them! In order for the PCC to respond appropriately, Councillor Dan Scott is working on a document showing what the original planning agreement was, any changes and what has actually been put in place. The **easement of land to access The Raven** from Barley Hill Lane has now gone through; Councillor Mike Davis took advice on whether this could be legally challenged and was advised that in doing so the PCC could have incurred costs and was likely to be unsuccessful in any challenge. So we didn't.

And talking about things rumbling on ... planning for the **Higher Green Farm Development**, access and field has been going on since 2012. Councillors Mike Davis and Tim Hues met with PCC solicitor Angus Wilson to discuss this very complicated situation. The previous PCC had the documents for completion in March, and took the decision not to complete as the PCC election was coming up. The concerns of the current PCC, and hence hesitancy in signing, are, among other things, with regard to access to the field site through the track at the end of Sillington Lane (which according to the planning should be maintained as grass, but has been laid with a thick layer of scalplings); pedestrian access only from the new HGF housing site rather than vehicular; applying to put anything on the now designated recreation area in the field would require specific planning permission and likely concerns from Highways re the use of Sillington Lane; the potential for the uplift payment, currently waived, to become liable in the future. Councillor Nina Jeffries has worked through from the minutes back to 2012, and has done a timeline showing decisions, issues and concerns in this development, although this is a bit problematic as we can't currently access supporting documentation such as letters and the basis for decisions etc. Members of the previous PCC are being very helpful in this process, and the PCC hope it will be completed for circulation to all Councillors for the next meeting so that we can identify next steps. Hopefully needless to say, but it bears repeating: all Councillors are concerned to understand our full obligations, make sure we understand the position of everyone in the village and ensure we get the best deal for the village before signing.

The next part of the meeting, concerning **financial matters**, was less exciting and, well, ... I did drift off a bit, I confess. This was safe in the knowledge that other members of the Council were on it. The Clerk reported on the separate accounts of the Poulshot Community Fund and the PCC accounts, the transfer of

funds into a different account (this is to ensure appropriate rates of interest and not going over specific amounts). And a reminder that anyone in the village can apply to the Community Fund through the Parish Council. Other exciting financial matters include payment to the Village Hall for meetings (currently problematic as key bill-organising people away, but sorted), the sorting out of new signatories for the PCC accounts, and getting a limited credit / debit card to pay some ongoing bills, such as the new website. And finally, Richard, the Clerk, is working on the reconciliation of the accounts, and there will be 2 special PCC meetings to address this: one meeting in August to go through the accounts and a meeting in early September to agree them. Keep up, do. So the accounts for this year will be sorted, although a challenge to last year's accounts is still standing. Okay, I know it's important, but it's not exciting is it?

Now, this is more like it ... talk about playing to our strengths. Councillor Caroline Nichols is a professional web designer (among other things) and is setting up a new PCC website, supported by Councillor Clare Church, also well versed in modern media (she's setting up a PCC Facebook page). We will communicate with you – website, Facebook, village magazine, accosting you down the pub ... well, only in a lovely way, obviously. We were all a bit startled to discover that someone has been busy snapping up a number of domain names with 'Poulshot' in them, but Councillor Nichols is confident that she can register one for us, and has secured a contract that will cost less than the current one (okay, only £3 a month less, but that's £36 a year, or £144 over the 4 years of the current PCC, enough and more to pay for a hog roast).

A letter from Chris Henwood led to a discussion about the allotments in the Green Gardens, providing water there as a village amenity, bills and maintenance around the village, Councillor Dan Scott continues to liaise with Jonny Hawkins, who has the contract for maintaining the PCC-responsible-parts-of-the-village. Apparently, that doesn't include my back garden, although he'd have some difficulty of getting his big tractor through the gates of gin club. The potential for more picnic benches in the Green Gardens (and elsewhere – do let us know any suggestions) was deferred to the next meeting.

So the key messages were (don't quite understand this bit, must find out!) - Support The Raven! - Caen Hill dual carriageway closed for re-surfacing 1st August. - PCC will lead village event / Beacon re Queen's Jubilee. And did we say – Support The Raven.

And that was it. Most of us immediately put our principles into practice and promptly adjourned to SUPPORT THE RAVEN. Items already tagged for the next meeting include – finally refunding money re VE

celebrations – the constitution and personnel on Sub-Committees – progress on the recruitment of a new Clerk – a report on the CATG meeting / Highways issues including Caen Hill and speeds through the village – update on the development of menage / stud / stables in Hay Lane - timeline / updates re Higher Green Farm development - finalised accounts for adoption and information / completion of new signatories for PCC - development of website, Facebook page. Do let us know if there's anything else you want to be raised. The dates for the extra meetings re the final accounts have yet to be agreed, but will be put on the Facebook page and publicised.

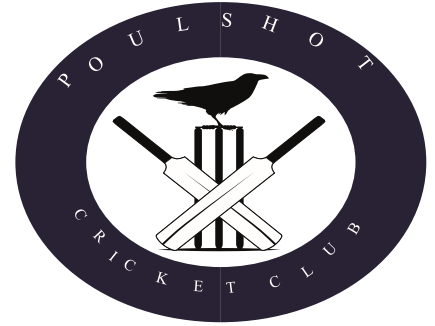

FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

Bicycle retailers have reported a sales boom over the last year as more of us have got back on our bikes. I've always enjoyed cycling and the opportunity to see lots of interesting things and discover new places that would be missed in a car or on the tube, as well as, of course, be active and travel more sustainably. I do understand though, that there are many reasons why people are not able, or do not feel safe or comfortable to cycle. Cycle Friendly Devizes is a local group working to improve local cycling facilities and to encourage more people to get on their bikes for both daily travel and for leisure. As Wiltshire Council Portfolio Holder for Climate Change, I am delighted to be working with them to develop a local cycling strategy and improvement plan. Last year the Group conducted a survey on local cycling and has now developed outline plans for routes to travel across the town and to link Devizes with villages in the area. On quite possibly the hottest day of 2021, Volunteers from Cycle Friendly Devizes, a number of Wiltshire Councillors and Simon Fisher, Devizes Town Council Clerk, met at Devizes Wharf to test out the routes towards Devizes Marina. Across Devizes Rural West, Adrian Griffiths from Poulshot has proposed improvements to a route using Hay Lane. As well as being a great way to travel into Devizes this route would also be a brilliant trip out, to perhaps drop into the newly re-opened The Raven Inn, which is now under the ownership of the Hues family at Poulshot Lodge Farm – with their fantastic meat at centre stage on the menu. There are also plans to develop a cycling and walking route from Potterne into Devizes and opportunities to connect many villages across the community area. I will communicate more information as these plans develop, in the meantime though please do email me with ideas and suggestions for other routes across the area, or join Cycle Friendly Devizes. Finally, a date for your diary! Saturday 4 September - Devizes Be Active 2021. Hosted by the Devizes Health & Wellbeing Group on Devizes Small Green from 11am – 3pm, organisations from across the area involved in health & wellbeing – from arts & crafts, to exercise classes, singing and dancing, including Cycle Friendly Devizes will be there. Please do get in touch if I can help in any way.

From Lay Minister Liz Starling

By the time you read this, the Covid restrictions will have been lifted across the UK and hopefully, we will have returned to some normality. There's understandably so much excitement about getting back to normal after the year we've had but also possibly some trepidation.

What is normal though? If I turn on the news, I see that 'normal' is anger, violence and hate. Is this what we're desperate to get back to? Or can we dream of a 'new normal'.

What if we started with a radical principle central to Jesus' teaching and life, seen in Matthew 5:43-44?

'You have heard that it was said, 'you shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, 'love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.'

In Luke 6:32-35 Jesus says:

"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those

who are good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do that... But love your enemies, do good to them...'

Normal is hating your enemies, loving those who only love you, doing good to those who do good to you. Jesus' normal is to love your enemies, love those who hate you, do good to those who do bad to you. Paul captures the practical reality of this in Romans 12:20-21:

'...if your enemies are hungry, feed them, if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads. Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.'

This is radical. There is nothing normal about loving your enemies. Jesus' teaching isn't just a nice add on to being a Christian. It isn't a teaching that we can choose to opt in or out to. This teaching is at the very heart of what it means to be a Christian.

What could a 'new normal' look like?

Jesus' normal' goes against the tide of our normal: anger, violence and hate. Jesus' normal is to love your enemies. Is this possible or even realistic? The love to our enemies is not only something of the heart; it is something of the will. Loving your enemies isn't simply a feeling, some kind of passive emotion. Loving your enemy is active! It requires action and willpower.

Actively love your enemies. This is most powerfully demonstrated in the story of Brant Jean. In 2018, Brandt's brother Botham was killed in his own apartment – where he was watching TV and eating ice-cream – by an off-duty, white Dallas police officer after she mistakenly entered his home, believing it to be hers. Brandt shocked many when he told Amber Guyger he forgave her and said he didn't want her to go to prison after she received a 10-year sentence in October for killing 26-year-old Botham. Brant didn't say what he said easily. He was a man that is determined to do the right thing. He was actively loving his enemy, choosing good over evil and choosing love over hate.

So, as we come out of this weird pandemic world, can we avoid heading back into 'normal life' and instead actively love our enemies. Can we actively love those who don't like us? Can we actively love those on the other side of the political or theological spectrum? Can we actively love

those who have hurt us? Can we actively love those who hate us? Can we actively love those we despise... the terrorist... the paedophile... the racist?

What could a 'new normal' look like?

'Jesus' normal' goes against the tide of our normal: anger, violence and hate. Jesus' normal is to love your enemies. Jesus' normal is to love those who hate you. Jesus' normal is to do good to those who do bad to you.
